

For this next DIY, you will be making a Christmas Carpet! The ingredients needed include: a large one colored carpet (preferably white), any color glitter, and any liquid glue. First, you use

Next, we will be making a Christmas wreath on a plate, (and, or) a bowl. For this particular craft, you will need: a bowl (and, or) plate, green paint (not washable), red paint (not washable), and if you want to spice it up a little, green (and, or) red glitter. To start, grab the plate or bowl.

Use the Green paint to make a wreath on the outlines of the plate or bowl. Then, if you chose to have sparkles, pour them on the painted areas (they should stick). Wait about five or ten minutes for the paint to dry.

Next, use the red paint to paint a bow onto the bowl or dish. And if you chose sparkles, add those to the Red painted areas. Wait about five or ten minutes to dry.

The U.S. government and military rely heavily on satellites for forecasting weather, collecting high-resolution images for intelligence and directing missiles with GPS satellites.

As Michigan Day arrives, appreciate what this pleasant peninsula provides

National Michigan Day is on January 18. Michigan became the 26th state on January 26,1837.

This state is known for many things, including cherries, automobile industry, and the Great Lakes. It is also the only state in the country to have an upper peninsula and a lower peninsula. Michigan's capital is Lansing, but the biggest city in the state is Detroit.

Our state's name comes from the Ojibwe word *mishigamaa*, meaning "large water" or "large lake." Michigan is the 10th most populous state and 11th most extensive area.

Many sports legends either played for Detroit pro teams or Michigan colleges, or were born in Michigan, including Sergei Fedorov, Kirk Gibson, Ted Lindsay, Isiah Thomas, Steve Yzerman, Barry Sanders, Ty Cobb, Gordie Howe, Tom Brady, Derek Jeter, and Joe Louis. Detroit has four professional sports teams: the Lions, Tigers, Pistons, and Red Wings.

Michigan's automobile industry became very popular in the early 1900s, around the time Henry Ford made the assembly line to speed up production for his company. The assembly line became known all around the country, and other car companies started using it. In 2017, more than 1.7 million vehicles rolled off assembly plants in the Detroit area, where Ford, Chevrolet, and Cadillac have a heavy presence.

Michigan's history starts in the 16th centu-



ry, when Algonquian tribes settled into the area. French explorers started coming, too, and they claimed the area and called it "New France". The first explorers were Etienne Brule and his crew. Michigan's first permanent European settlement was founded in 1668. Jacques Marquette founded this settlement, and called it Sault Ste. Marie, which was used as a base for Catholic missions. The French discovered the Algonquian living there, and they traded and became friends. Years later, the Algonquian tribes and the French started battling the English, and the war was called the French-and -Indian War.

Michigan is an extraordinary state, and there are many things to do in winter including skiing, fat tire biking, visiting frozen waterfalls, and snow tubing. You can go to Frankenmuth and visit Bronner's, the world's largest Christmas store!
